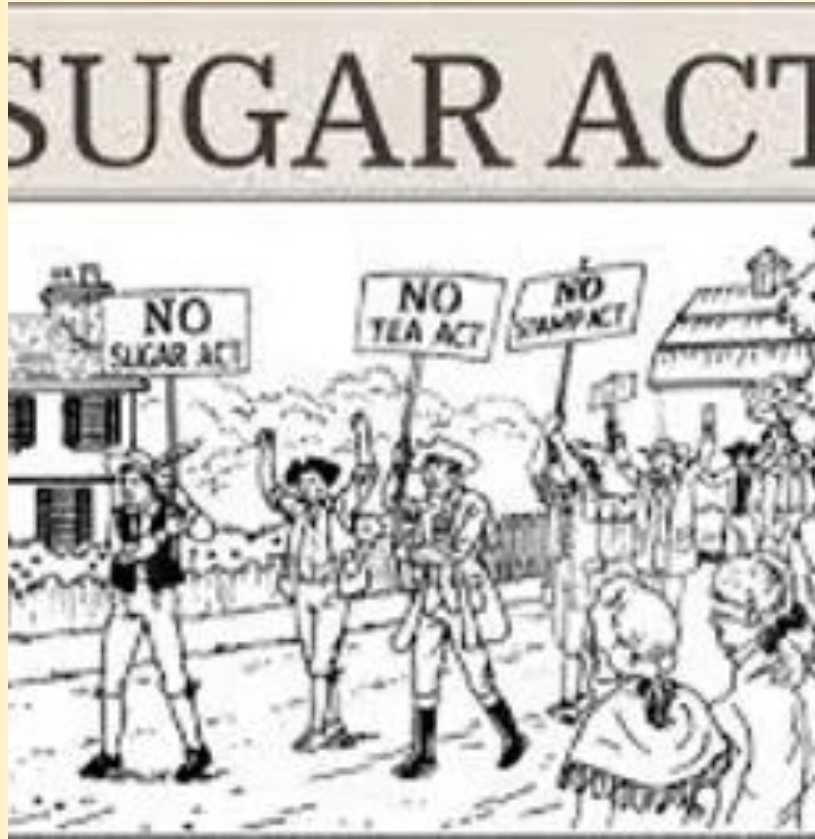




SUGAR ACT

The Sugar Act of 1764 was a British law aimed at raising revenue from the American colonies by imposing taxes on sugar and molasses, significantly impacting colonial trade and contributing to the American Revolution.

STAMP ACT

The Stamp Act required colonists to pay taxes on paper goods such as playing cards, legal documents, newspapers, diplomas, and contracts. The tax helped to pay for the debt from the French and Indian War. The colonists eventually rallied and eventually formed the Stamp Act Congress for unity and the act was repealed.



TOWNSHEND ACT



The Townshend Acts were named after Charles Townshend, member of the British Parliament. The Act taxed the colonists on lead, glass, paper, paint and tea.
